Lyle School District Facing Severe Cuts

District could be dissolved in worst-case scenario

Uncertainty continues to grow around the Lyle school district following a budget workshop held recently with the assistance of Tim Merlino of ESD112.

During its annual review of school budgets and actual funds, the State of Washington determined that Lyle School district was "in the hole," according to Merlino. That determination triggered a set of binding conditions, one of which required the school board to determine if the 2011-12 budget could be balanced. The good news for Lyle is that, on paper, using the expected tax revenue due through the end of 2012, the budget could be balanced.

With that condition met, Merlino has now set out to assist Superintendent Martin Huffman and the Lyle school board in developing a balanced budget for the 2012-13 school year, and all indications are that there will be some tough cuts ahead.

One of the challenges is that according to Merlino, there will likely be

substantially fewer students next year, partially due to families opting out of the school district. "Our indications are that there could be 75 fewer students," says Merlino, which would be almost a 25 percent cut given the current year student population of 311.

One of the cuts on the table is an administrator for a savings of \$90,000. Merlino says when Dallesport Middle School came on line, there were about 450 students. The district has been making cuts, including teaching positions. "We think it only fair that administrative cuts be included if we are cutting teachers," says Merlino. "We want to keep as much of the classroom support as we can." Five and a half FTE of certified staff and another \$111,000 of classified staff funding is also on the chopping block. Another item on the block that has been a hot issue for some time is \$35,000 of supplemental contracts, including payments to Huffman and Principal Phil Williams,

who were backfilling for classes or activities where cuts have been previously made.

Another \$110,000 could also be gained, says Merlino, by eliminating the athletic budget. The intent is to find a way to continue the sports by using volunteer coaches, which would save nearly \$80,000 and have ASB funds cover officials and perhaps part of the transportation budget. Fundraisers are also being considered to keep the sports programs afloat.

A lot is riding on the school board resolving the budget problems at Lyle. If they fail, the State can take control of the school and appoint an administrator with the goal of making the school solvent. If that proves impossible, the district could be dissolved, which, according to Merlino, "nobody wants."

Dallesport Elementary Students Win Free Bicycles

Dallesport Elementary students who worked hard in the Accelerated Reader program got a welcome surprise in the last few days of school when two of them won a free bicycle from Masonic Lodge No. 163 in White Salmon.

Second grader Aaron Smith and first grader Emma Clark were the two winners.

Martin Huffman, the school's principal, said the students were chosen when the teachers got together and voted on which students had put in the most effort and improved the most over the year. Huffman said Clark and Smith, who had no idea they were going to receive the award, were very excited.

Teacher Nancy Moon said teachers voted for Clark because she had started the year in the lowest reading group in the room but worked her way up the ladder and was in the most challenging group by the end of the

school year. Smith was nominated because he grew 2.5 years' worth of reading levels in a single school year. The choices were unanimous.

"Both children always had a book close at hand to read," Moon said. "Emma was like a reading machine in my classroom."

Huffman said the Accelerated Reader program is a good one because it gives children an incentive to read books at whatever level they are at.

"The students can read at their own pace, and keep improving. It's an individual program instead of a group one," he said.

Every year the school has group contests and tracks the progress the whole school is making with something on the wall, like feet or paper chains. Huffman said that gives the students a visual reminder that spurs them to read more books to make the chain even longer.

Students have won small prizes in the past but Huffman said this is the first year Dallesport has been chosen by the Masonic Lodge as one of the schools to receive free bicycles under their nationwide "Bikes for Books" program, so when Rick Waites and other Masons brought the prizes to the June 7 awards ceremony the children didn't know they would be winning such a big prize.

"It was a great thing, and the kids were really surprised because the staff had kept it a secret," Huffman said.

Burglary Prevention Tips

There has been a recent increase in the number of burglaries in Dallesport.

The following burglary prevention tips will help to make you and your family safer.

The burglary basics:

- Make your home look occupied, and make it difficult to break in.
- Lock all outside doors and windows before you leave the house or go to bed. Even if it is for a short time, lock your doors.
- Leave lights on when you go out. If you are going to be away for a length of time, connect some lamps to automatic timers to turn them on in the evening and off during the day.
- Keep your garage door closed and locked.
- Don't allow daily deliveries of mail, newspapers or flyers build up while you are away. Arrange with the Post Office to hold your mail, or arrange for a friend or neighbor to pick up your mail regularly.
- Arrange for your lawn to be mowed if you are going away for an extended time.
- Check your locks on doors and windows and replace them with secure devices as necessary.
- Pushbutton locks on doorknobs are easy for burglars to open. Install deadbolt locks on all your outside doors.
- Sliding glass doors are vulnerable. Special locks are available for better security.
- Other windows may need better locks. Check with a locksmith or hardware store for alternatives.

• Don't tempt a thief:

- Lawn mowers, snow blowers, barbecues and bicycles are best stored out of sight.
- Always lock your garden sheds and garages.
- Use curtains on garage and basement windows.
- Never leave notes on your door such as "Gone shopping."

• Locks...get the best:

- No lock, regardless of its quality, can be truly effective. Key-in dead bolt locks provide minimum security. Ask a locksmith for advice on your situation.
- Change locks immediately if your keys are lost or stolen.
- When moving into a new home, have all locks changed.

• Targeting the Outside:

- Have adequate exterior lighting. A motion-sensitive light is recommended for backyards.
 - Trim trees and shrubs so that they cannot be used as hiding places for intruders.
- Make sure your door hinges are on the inside.

• Windows:

- Most windows can be pinned for security.
- Drill a 3/16" hole on a slight downward slant through the inside window frame and halfway into the outside frame - place a nail in the hole to secure the window.

• Alarms:

- An alarm system is excellent for home security. It provides peace of mind to homeowners, especially while on vacation. There is a wide variety of alarm systems on the market.

- Alarm systems that make loud noise and bright light are usually adequate. Silent (monitored) alarms have ongoing costs, and the long police response times in rural areas can make them impractical.

- Discreetly positioned game cameras can photograph trespassers or burglars, in the event that your home is targeted. This can be solid evidence that will assist the police.

• If Your Home Is Broken Into:

- If you come home to find an unexplained open/broken window or door:
 - Do not enter - the perpetrator may still be inside.
 - Use a neighbor's phone to call police.
 - Do not touch anything or clean up until the police have inspected for evidence.
 - Write down the license plate numbers of any suspicious vehicles.
 - Note the descriptions of any suspicious persons.

• Other precautions you should take:

- Never leave keys under doormats, flowerpots, mailboxes or other "secret" hiding places -- burglars know where to look for hidden keys.
- Keep all computers password protected, and log off when away from home.
- Keep a detailed inventory of your valuable possessions, including a description of the items, date of purchase and original value, and serial numbers, and keep a copy in a safe place away from home -- this is a good precaution in case of fires or other disasters. Make a photographic or video record of valuable objects, heirlooms and antiques. Your insurance company can provide assistance in making and keeping your inventory.
- Be a good neighbor. If you notice anything suspicious in your neighborhood, call 911 immediately.
- Mark your valuables with your name or initials, NOT driver's license or SSN. If the items are stolen, then the thief has this identifying information about you. Marked items are harder for a burglar to dispose of and easier for police to recover. You can borrow an engraver from your precinct.
- Form a Neighborhood Watch Group. We can help you work with your neighbors to improve security and reduce risk of burglary.
- Consider installing a burglar alarm system.
- The MOST important thing YOU can do is CALL THE Klickitat County Sheriffs Dept. to report a CRIME or any SUSPICIOUS activity. You have to be the eyes of your neighborhood. And remember you can always remain a pair of anonymous eyes!
- Remember the three L's of Crime Prevention: **LIGHTS, LOCKS & the LAW!**
- **Light** up your residence, **lock** your doors at all times, and call the **Law** when you see something suspicious.
