Dallesport Water District

Dallesport Water District is pleased to announce that DWD through sponsorship with Klickitat County has been selected for a \$750,000 Grant for Water system Improvements in Murdock. Klickitat County has also pledged an additional \$75,000 as matching funds to the project. It is anticipated that design will take place during the fall/winter of 2013 and construction of the new Water system will begin in the spring of 2014. To all those individuals who played a part in this funding process, DWD and the citizens of Murdock extend a very heartfelt -Thank You!

DWD has also been awarded a \$28,000 Grant from Washington State Department of Health for development of a Water System Plan for Murdock.

At its June meeting DWD rejected all bids on the New Booster Pump/Treatment Facility for Dallesport. The project will be re-evaluated in the coming weeks and re-bid at a future date. It is still anticipated that the project will be completed prior to June 2014.

The new 218,000 gallon Reservoir has been completed, and is now connected to the existing system.

Consumer Confidence Reports will be mailed out shortly and we ask that all customers take the time to read them and know the quality of your drinking water and what is going on with your purveyor.

Murdock Water

DWD has been working to provide improvements to the Murdock area for several years.

The following narrative shows a timeline of the current Murdock Water situation:

In 2010 Murdock Water deeded the entire Murdock System to Dallesport Water District, thereby allowing the District to pursue Public Funds for repairs or replacement. At an IACC conference in October 2011, the District Manager laid out the Murdock needs before a team of the finest Public Agency funding Specialists in the State.

In the spring of 2011 DWD through a grant with USDA had RCAC conduct an income survey of the Murdock Water area. With the data gathered by RCAC it is evident that a Low Income (or LMI situation) exists in Murdock with 63% qualifying households.

Replacement and rerouting of a portion of the Ash/Beech Street waterline in 2011 and 2012 eliminated Coliform Bacteria hits and helped aid flow to the customers in those areas. Connecting both wells together has also improved the situation. However we realized that these repairs are only repairs and a long term solution is required.

Murdock completed a Sanitary Survey by Department of Health in 2011. DOH pledged to work with the District to obtain

the funding necessary to complete a water system plan for the entire Murdock area. In May 2011 DWD met with various State agencies to outline the needs for Murdock. In July 2011 DWD made application to Washington State for Public Works Trust Fund Monies to improve the Murdock Distribution System. In the fall of 2011 DWD Made Application to the Klickitat County Commissioners for support in a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) application, however were not selected by the County Commissioners at that time, due to previous County investments in Klickitat.

In July 2012 DWD was awarded of \$186,000 in PWTF Loan Money for Distribution Main replacements in Murdock. However the PWTF money was a loan and as a loan, would have to be repaid through the rate structure. To avoid significantly higher rates, DWD once again approached Klickitat County for sponsorship on another CDBG Grant application in the fall of 2012, and this time Murdock Water/DWD were selected as the County's #1 Project. DWD hired John Grim, PE of Lyle to prepare the CDBG application.

Minor Addition had also recently come under DWD Management and helped in establishing a consolidation plan for Murdock to aid on the Grant application showing the Murdock Community needs

not only for new waterlines but an actual Reservoir with fire protection and a new Community Well.

In May 2013 Murdock Water/DWD was awarded a \$28,000 Grant from Washington State Department of Health for Water System Planning. The plan will establish the needs, range of consolidation and service area for a New Community Water System. Development of this plan will begin in July 2013.

On June 13, 2013 DWD received word that Klickitat County & DWD had been selected for receiving a \$750,000 CDBG grant for a New Water System in Murdock. Klickitat County has pledged to provide the 10% matching money required for the Grant in the amount of \$75,000.

So begins a design/construction timeline for Murdock's New Water System. Current projections are that Engineering/Design will take place in the fall/winter of 2013 and in the spring of 2014 DWD will bid and begin construction of the New Water System. There are far too many people to list to say Thank You for their assistance in this project becoming a reality, and the list will grow as construction begins. But to each one who played a part in the vision of creating something better for Murdock; **DWD and the citizens of Murdock extend a very heartfelt -Thank You!**

Broadband gets state grants

Klickitat County gets \$60,000

Broadband advocates in six counties, including Klickitat and Skamania counties, and 10 tribal communities will spend the next year improving access and increasing broadband use in their part of the state.

The five Local Technology Planning Teams will begin work this month thanks to \$300,000 in grant money awarded by the Washington State Broadband Office of the Department of Commerce.

Successful proposals showed community or region wide collaboration on

programs that included everything from training in e-commerce and web site development for small businesses to a region-wide project for underserved tribal lands. All work proposed in the applications must be completed by June 30, 2014.

Gov. Jay Inslee congratulated the grant awardees and commended their work on broadband.

"These grants are part of the state's commitment to economic development in rural and underserved communities in Washington State," Inslee said. "Local technology planning teams will identify their own broadband needs and strategies for increasing access and adoption where they live. The results will go a long way to assisting job creation efforts already under way."

Successful applicants were:

Klickitat-Skamania Local Technology Planning Team was awarded \$60,000 to provide community identified broadband training and address gaps in infrastructure through partnerships with our region's governments, providers, communities and businesses and increasing access to broadband via public hotspots.

Washington State University was awarded \$56,000 to leverage broadband needs assessment activities already begun in Jefferson and Clallam counties. Lincoln County was awarded \$26,880 to address educational challenges and economic development opportunities in Lincoln County by increasing broadband access and use.

Affiliated Tribes of Northwest Indians Tribal Technology Team was awarded \$94,000 to provide broadband and communications planning to Washington State Tribes including needs assessment, infrastructure/services inventory and gap analysis.

Walla Walla Valley Chamber of Commerce was awarded \$64,000 to partner with the Intelligent Community Forum, a think tank that focuses on broadband centric economic and social development strategies and leverage their expertise through its Community Accelerator Program.

Grant recipients were chosen from a field of 13 applicants representing more than a dozen cities, 14 counties and 13 tribes with requests totaling more than \$770,000. This is the second and final round of funding for the program.

The funding for these grants comes from the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) through the Broadband Technology Opportunities

Program administered by the National Telecommunications and Information Agency. This grant program, designed to support local technology planning teams, aligns with the broadband strategy identified in the final report of a broadband committee convened at the request of the Governor and the Legislature in 2008. *White Salmon Enterprise*

Tribes Open Commercial Fishery For Summer Chinook And Sockeye Salmon

The Nez Perce, Umatilla, Warm Springs, and Yakama tribes began commercial sales from their summer fishery on June 17. Pre-season forecasts estimate a run of 73,500 summer chinook and 180,500 sockeye. Depending on the actual run sizes, Indian fishers may harvest approximately 20,000 summer chinook and 12,000 sockeye, most of which will be sold commercially.

Both treaty and non-treaty fishery catches will be adjusted throughout the season as the run size is updated. The tribal fishery is protected under 1855 treaties with the federal government, where the Yakama Nation, Warm Springs, Umatilla, and Nez Perce tribes reserved the right to fish at all usual and accustomed fishing places in the Columbia River Basin—a treaty right that

reserves ceremonial, subsistence, and commercial uses.

The upper Columbia River's summer chinook populations—populations destined for the Wenatchee, Methow and Okanagan river systems—are considered healthy and are not listed under the Endangered Species Act. Although Snake River sockeye are listed under the endangered Species Act, the majority of sockeye are returning to the Okanagan River in Canada and are not listed under the ESA. The increased sockeye returns to the Okanagan River are the direct result of sockeye enhancement programs currently underway by the Okanagan Nation Alliance, a group of First Nations tribes in British Columbia.

The tribal fishery offers an ample supply of fish direct-to-public sales. Common sales locations include: Marine

Park in Cascade Locks, Lone Pine in The Dalles, North Bonneville (one mile east of Bonneville Dam), and Columbia Point in the Tri-Cities area.

Bring a cooler with ice and keep the following tips in mind:

- Sales from Indian fishers generally run from 10 a.m. to dusk.
- Most sales are cash only.
- Buyers should request a receipt.

The public is urged to call the salmon marketing program at (888) 289-1855 before heading up the river to find out where the day's catch is being sold. Energy Savings Tips

Saving energy costs

The average homeowner spends about \$1900.00 a year on energy costs. You can lower your energy bills and help save the environment at the same time.

Here are some simple energy saving tips to lower your utility bills this summer

Set your thermostat to 78 when you are home and 86 when you are away.

Do your laundry efficiently by using the cold or warm water setting. Always use cold to rinse your clothes.

Replace air conditioner filters. Dirty filters restrict airflow and can cause your system to run longer, increasing energy use. Replace or clean filters monthly for maximum benefit.

Unplug electronic devices and chargers when they aren't in use. Most new

electronics use electricity even when switched off.

Change Your Light Bulbs

A 20-watt compact fluorescent light bulb produces the same amount of light as a 75-watt incandescent bulb. By changing bulbs, you not only use less energy, but CFLs produce less heat and have longer bulb life -- up to seven times that of incandescent bulbs. Use daylight for work and reading whenever possible. If you need lights, turn them off when you leave the room.

Use a Ceiling Fan

Ceiling fans make your place look like Rick's in the film Casablanca, and chill the premises, too. A ceiling fan circulates the air in the whole room, creating a windchill factor that makes the temperature seem lower than it is. According to the U.S.

Department of Energy, you can raise the thermostat on the central air or room air conditioner by 4 degrees when you use a ceiling fan.

Use Power Strips

Almost any device that charges batteries; has a continuous display, such as a light-emitting diode; uses an external power supply; or operates via a remote control continuously draws power, according to the Lawrence Berkeley National Laboratory (see References 5). Plug all chargers, televisions and computers into power strips. Then turn off the entire strip with one click to save electricity when you are not using the electronics or when they are fully charged (see References 1). A power strip with a surge protector will save your expensive gear from sudden power surges, too.
