Whether you're a family seeking food security... a senior looking for a hot meal... a homeless family... a victim of abuse... a worker seeking training for a new job... a family who needs help with an electric bill during the cold winter months or any of countless others who rely on WGAP for a hand up or fresh start... we are here for you.

Rainbow Valley Volunteers

The Rainbow Valley Volunteers is WGAP's gleaning program. Gleaning is the process of harvesting usable, but unharvested or unmarketable food. These fruits and vegetables are then distributed to low income families, Seniors, Disabled, and local food banks. In this region of the Columbia River Gorge, there are many opportunities to glean.

Individuals are able to register their fruit and nut trees and/or their garden on a Harvest Project registry cooperatively maintained with the Klickitat County Health Department. When ripe and ready, the Rainbow Valley Volunteers glean the produce.

Just a few examples of their success:

Four Volunteers gleaned 1,100 pounds of pears and apples

A crew of seven Volunteers gleaned 400 pounds of sweet cherries

In the months of July 2012 the White Salmon and Goldendale

RVV groups collected more than 14 tons of food!

As more families struggle to meet their basic needs, the Rainbow Valley Volunteers is an excellent community resource.

Food Banks and Nutrition

WGAP is the Lead Agency and Distribution Center for the Food Banks in Klickitat and Skamania counties. Low-income individuals and families are eligible for a Food Box once a month. Food boxes may contain canned goods, fresh produce, bread, and frozen meat. While the food in a box varies, generally there is enough for three to twelve nutritionally balanced meals depending on the size of the family.

A special Senior Box is also available, and for individuals with medical conditions requiring special diets, Special Dietary Needs boxes partially supply the necessary food. A Doctor's Statement of the medical condition is required for Special Needs boxes, and are available at WGAP Food Bank.

Home Energy Assistance

Book Review

"Stone Cold" by C.J. Box

C. J. Box has a series featuring Wyoming Game Warden Joe Pickett, a hard headed, dedicated employee of the Wyoming Game and Fish Department. While he is an excellent Game Warden, he is not known as a team player. He does what he thinks is right, office politics be damned. This has not made his career path an easy one besides the fact that he is hell on departmental equipment.

The latest in this series is called Stone Cold and as an ardent fan of Joe Pickett and thereby of C.J. Box, I can safely say that this is one of the best yet.

Joe's old pal, Nate Romanowski, a man of strong beliefs and exceptional skills, has a new employer. Nate is an expert at staying off the grid and this makes him an ideal man for his new job. Things are going along fairly smoothly...until Joe Pickett is assigned to investigate Nate's employer.

Who is this mysterious, ultra rich man who has moved into an economically depressed, under populated county in Wyoming and now seems to run the whole place? Joe finds out that certain people are above any laws and the sheriff and a local judge seem to answer only to the Main Man of the county. All or most of the businesses have been taken over by him, many families owe him for huge favors he has done for them and Joe runs into resistance and brick walls at every turn. Besides the fact that everyone in the county seems to know Joe's business before he even knows it himself. Everyone is deeply connected, even the local Game Warden, who seems to block Joe at every turn.

All this, and throw into the mix that Joe's oldest daughter Sheridan is having some problems at college that may or may not put her in physical danger. Joe has to juggle his personal life while investigating the mystery man who seems to wield such overwhelming power.

The big question is, how is this man maintaining such a level of wealth, living out in the boonies as he is? There are rumors of kill for hire plots but nothing leads back to the Main Man, of course.

So Joe does what he does best. Sticks his nose in and refuses to back out. Events spiral quickly out of control.

What follows is typical C.J. Box, fast moving events that mount the tension higher and higher until a

spectacular ending that ties it all in a neat, tidy knot. A well written thriller of a mystery, I recommend this to anyone who loves a thrill a minute story.

C. J. Box, you can't write 'em fast enough for me.

Klickitat County Determination of Mitigated Non-Significance

Notice is hereby given that Klickitat County issued a Mitigated Determination of Non-significance (MDNS) on August 14, 2014, under SEPA Rules (Chapter 197-11 WAC) and the Klickitat County Environmental Ordinance Number 121084 for the following proposals:

SEP2013-23: The project proposes to create a 23 site RV Park will full hook-ups, bathroom building addition, septic system, signage, access driveways, screening, lighting parking areas and open space. The site area is approximately 2.15 acres. The proposed project is located within a portion of Section 21, T2N, R13, W.M., Klickitat County, WA, Murdock Vicinity (2297 Dallesport Rd).

After review of the completed environmental checklists and other information on file the Klickitat County Responsible Official has determined that these proposals will not have probable significant adverse impacts on the environment. Copies of the MDNS are available at the Klickitat County Planning Department during normal business hours. Comments or appeals on the above environmental review will be accepted until 5:00 pm September 5, 2014. Appeals must be filed with the Klickitat County Auditor's office. Appeals shall not be deemed complete without payment of the appeal fees applicable to class A projects, payable to Klickitat County Planning Department.

County Emergency Management Offers Alerts For Several Situations

Klickitat County utilizes a mass notification system called the Klickitat County Emergency Notification System to notify residents of emergency situations. All landlines within Klickitat County are automatically entered in the system.

However, due to privacy laws, cell phones and other communication devices are not automatically entered the same way that landlines are. As a result, citizens of Klickitat County are urged to create a secure profile to register their cell phones.

Receive alerts about emergencies and other important community messages that may affect work places and residents in Klickitat County. By signing up for the Emergency Notification System, citizens will be quickly notified of important critical information such as severe weather, wildfires, floods, street and road closures, missing persons, law enforcement activities, and evacuation notifications.

and click the "Register Your Phone" icon at the top of the page. You'll be prompted to create an account and a profile if you wish. To make changes to your profile, choose "Manage Profile." Then just follow the instructions.

Citizens can choose what kind of alerts they wish to receive. These include: law enforcement and fire alerts, water and power outages, public works alerts, traffic closures, severe weather alerts, and public meeting alerts. You can also indicate in a profile any special medical needs such as mobility problems, oxygen tank dependent, hearing and vision impairment, and more. There is also a place to sign up for volunteer duties in an emergency, including medical professional, fluency in other languages, operator or owner of heavy equipment, disaster service worker, incident command experience, computer skills, and counseling/mental health background. *Reprinted with permission from Goldendale Sentinel.*



Pig Bowl

Donovan Doroski, one of the 2013 Pig Bowl recipient,

spent four months in Seattle this year as he underwent a bone marrow transplant to battle Hodgkin's Disease.

Donovan's mother, Isabelle Doroski, shared the story of Donovan's experiences since the Pig Bowl.

"What a long journey it has been," she wrote. "The first few days in Seattle back in February started badly as Donovan's Jeep got stolen from the parking garage at La Quinta, where we were blessed with one week of free stay."

A TV CREW films Donovan Doroski's Jeep after it was stolen, stripped and abandoned in February during his first week in Seattle for a four-month bone marrow process.

Media helped spread word of the theft.

"We think the thieves felt a lot of pressure and after taking tires, stereo, tools and all that you can imagine of the Jeep, the vehicle was abandoned in a field," Isabelle wrote. "People we don't even know offered their vehicles, they offered to take Don to his appointments. They offered a place to stay. It was just so stressful, but also so incredibly amazing to see the good in people."

Local businesses stepped up, too, offering wheels and tires.

"We even had to turn down our local Les Schwab, Nelson Tires and Urness." Once the wheels and tires were on, another business installed sound and alarm systems. Another added a bumper and winch.

"You may say it is just a car, but for Donovan, it was his only pride and joy, the only thing that made him feel like a normal teenager.

The Doroskis found a basement apartment 20 minutes from the hospital with kind and caring owners.

"Donovan's transplant on March 19 went very well," Isabelle wrote. "They were able to collect 3.5 liters of bone marrow from Keith (his father). It was a very scary and emotional time. Words can't describe the way we felt. It was quite a tough procedure for both the

donor and the recipient but nothing would have stopped my husband in order to save our boy's life."

Donovan stayed at the University of Washington for a couple of days and family members wanted to boost his morale with something special, so they brought his dog, Wyatt, for a quick visit. The only condition was that the dog had to stay in the car and could not give him kisses.

"After the transplant, Don was very tired," Isabelle wrote. "He lost his hair, his appetite and started to get some GI tract infection and an infection in his colon, as well. All is expected and is called GVHD (Graft Versus Host Disease). He is going to have to watch his body for the rest of his life as it can declare itself anytime and anywhere in his body."

Donovan and his mom drove to the Seattle Cancer Care Alliance each day for four hours of fluids, other weekly or biweekly labs, nutritionist visits and clinics with his transplant team.

"There is never a minute to sit and breathe," Isabelle wrote. "There is sanitizing all day long, preparing meals, making sure he takes his meds on time, making sure we refill his prescriptions, make it on time to his appointments and also work as much as I can remotely to keep my job; getting up every couple of hours to check on him during the night and make sure he has no temperature, give him his meds. There is also piles and piles of bills to go through and making sure the insurance pays what they are supposed to, then there is the back and forth to Hood River to take care of our house and pets and be with our younger daughter.

"There is so much, I can't even put it into words, but there is nothing we wouldn't do for our son, so it really doesn't matter..." Keith's recovery from the donor procedure took about six weeks. He is unemployed and lost his unemployment benefits in June.

"So we are now down to my partial income only and this is a new crisis we have to face," Isabelle said. "We do not know how we will be able to keep our home in Hood River and keep on paying our bills."

Donovan made it a goal to be in attendance for his younger sister's high school graduation and her wish was to have him there. He worked with the doctors, who were not happy about

letting him go. But his improvements at the time made it possible.

"So we learned how to do his IVs ourselves and we got all the supplies and the IV pump and off to Hood River we went," Isabelle wrote. "Don's sisters flew in from Montana and Las Vegas and joined us. It was a wonderful couple of days. Julie was so thrilled, she had tears of joy."

During the four months in Seattle, when Donovan felt good enough, he researched on the computer ways to return to school. He found out he had been accepted at Eastern Oregon University, where his girlfriend attends.

"He can't wait to move to La Grande and continue his education," Isabelle wrote. Law enforcement, emergency medical technician and park ranger are some of the career choices he is considering.

Donovan had an exciting event on Father's Day weekend when Kevin Costner and his wife, Christine, flew him and his family first class on American Airlines to Dubuque, Iowa, to be part of the 25th anniversary of "Field of Dreams" in Dyersville.

"We are very grateful to the Costners for their incredible gift and for allowing us to make some new and wonderful memories together."

In late June, the Doroskis learned that the cheek swab, scan, bone marrow biopsy and skin biopsy came back negative.

"He is doing great and the doctors are very pleased," Isabelle wrote. He was discharged June 26.

Donovan is regaining his strength and feeling pretty good overall.

Donovan celebrated his 21st birthday on Aug 29th.

School Zone

As a brand new school year begins, the U.S. Department of Transportation's National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) reminds parents, students and motorists to be alert and to put safety first in school zones and near school bus stops.

Teach children how to stay safe around a school bus:

Stand at least six feet (three giant steps) from the approaching school bus while waiting at the bus stop.

Wait to board the bus until the driver says it is safe.

When getting off of the bus, cross the street in front of the bus and make sure the bus driver sees you.

Always watch for oncoming traffic when approaching or leaving the bus.

How motorists can keep kids safe around the school bus:

When driving in neighborhoods with bus stops, schools and school zones, watch out for children walking or bicycling to school. Slow down. Look for children walking in the street, especially if there are no sidewalks in the neighborhood.

Remember, children do not easily estimate vehicle speeds and often misjudge when it is safe to cross the street when a vehicle is approaching.

Learn and obey the school bus laws. Obey the "flashing signal light system" that school bus drivers use to alert motorists of pending actions:

Yellow flashing lights indicate that the bus is preparing to stop to load or unload children. Motorists should slow down and prepare to stop their vehicles.

Red flashing lights and extended stop arms indicate that the bus has stopped, and that children are getting on or off. Motorists must stop their cars and wait until the red lights stop flashing, the extended stop sign is withdrawn, and the bus begins moving before they can start driving again.

Harvest Moom Walk

Take time to appreciate the Harvest moon on Monday, Sept. 8 when the Discovery Center offers a free interpretive walk down the scenic Riverfront Trail. Meet natural and cultural history interpreter Steve Thompson in front of the Discovery Center at 6:30 p.m. for this one hour hike. As the sun sets, take advantage of the opportunity to ask questions about native plants, Lewis and Clark, or the many Oregon Trail historic sites along the way. The path is paved and handicap-accessible. Hikers may continue off-trail on a moderately-sloped descent down to the banks and shallows of the Columbia River. The crest of the moon's full phase comes at 6:38 p.m. PDT. This is the night of the brightest, fullest moon for the Americas.
