Cougars, Cubs and Wildcats Head Back to School

The entire Lyle School District is a buzz with the excitement of a new school year! 2015-16 is shaping up to be the best of this century as our School Board, leadership, teachers and support staff come together to ensure that the individualized needs of each and every one of our students is met! Following are some highlights that you'll want to note-

- ❁ The school day at Dallesport Elementary School has been lengthened to create a new daily schedule full of learning and enrichment. The school day will begin at 8:30am and end at 3:30pm. This extension of 60 minutes per day, equals the addition of 22 days of instruction over the school year! This not only brings us into compliance with the State Board of Education, but creates a myriad of opportunities for each of our K-5 students to learn and experience both a rigorous core academic curriculum but also new exploratory offerings.*
- ❁ If you are the parent of a 4-year old, we invite you to join us on September 3rd at 7pm at Dallesport Elementary School to discuss the creation of The Dallesport Early Acceleration for Equitable Student Outcomes Pre-School. Our goal is to create options for our community to access affordable pre-school that will be blended with our kindergarten program to ensure that our kinders "entry level" radically improves which will in turn ensure that student achievement and the trajectory for success at ALL grade levels improves. Our goal is to launch a pilot program in September for 4 year olds that are not currently eligible for Kindergarten. Saburo Akita

August 30, 1923 -

August 7, 2015

Saburo Akita, a longtime resident of Dallesport, Washington, passed away quietly on August 7, 2015 at his residence. He was the fourth of eleven children of Chiyo and Nobuhei Akita. He was 91 years old and is survived by his sister, Wasco Fujiwara, The Dalles, his brother, Fred Akita, The Dalles, his five children: James, Dallesport, Wash., Raymond Akita (Vicki), Richland, Wash., Nancy Finch (Daryl) Auburn, Wash., Byron Akita (Merrie) The Dalles, Ore., and Jane Breslow (Steve) Hillsboro, Ore., his grandchildren: Ken, Daniel, Timothy, Kimberly, Cavan, Adrienne and Chance, his great-grandchildren: Kara, Justin and Kylie and numerous nephews and nieces.

He was born in The Dalles, Ore., on August 30, 1923 and attended Lyle High School. During WWII, he and his family were relocated to a Federal Internment Camp for Japanese Americans at Tule Lake, Calif. He was able to travel to Salt Lake City and Chicago on a work release program from the Internment Camps during the war years and worked at various jobs. He was drafted into the US Army in WWII and was honorably discharged due to a medical condition. He married Marie Toda on September 25, 1948. The couple lived in the Portland area for a few years before returning to the Akita family farm in Dallesport. He spent the last 60 years working on their produce farm and cherry orchard. He was the first one in Dallesport to have a commercial cherry orchard and was a commissioner on both the Dallesport Fire District and the Dallesport Irrigation District. He was well known for his great tasting tomatoes!

If he was not driving tractors, he was working on them. He loved to tinker on cars and in his youth, he had a reputation for driving a "little" over the speed limit. He had a very well equipped garage and it was not unusual for the neighborhood teenagers to be at the farm fixing their cars. He liked traveling and enjoyed driving and riding in the car during his later years.

He was generous with his time and resources and his home was often used for large family gatherings. He will be missed by all who knew him.

Saburo was preceded in death by his wife of 66 years, Marie, and his parents

Shaniko Wool Gathering 2015 **September 12, 2015 - September 13, 2015**

Established in 1900, Shaniko, Oregon was a railroad terminus that earned the title of the largest inland wool shipping center in the world by 1903. With wool sales in the millions of dollars and increased shipping volumes, Shaniko was referred to as the "Wool Capital of the World". Richard Roland Hinton, who had come to the nearby Bakeoven Area several decades earlier, developed a breed of sheep called the "Columbia". His famous Imperial Stock Ranch and descendants of his breed still exist today. Shaniko had two large warehouses, one of which still stands. How do we say a quarter of one still stands?

In celebration of this great heritage, Shaniko has embraced the opportunity to provide a rendezvous/marketplace for wool growers and fiber artists. This year will include but is not limited to: Fiber Artists & Vendors, Quilt displays, Stitching Crafts, and Demonstrations, Pioneer Camp, Shaniko Murals, Museums & Historic Buildings.

While there is free RV parking and camping on streets of town camping in the town itself, you can make your way to [Maupin](#) (twenty eight miles away) to spend the night along one of the top recreational retreats next to the Deschutes River. When adults don't follow the code of cooperation, staff will:

- Go to the source: using positive assumptions, peers will sensitively address the breach of conduct and offer help and support
- Be a critical friend or coach to the staff member who is need of support
- Model appropriate behavior

When adults don't follow the code of cooperation, administration will:

- Mediate a discussion, if necessary
- Have a conversation with the staff member, and offer support
- Have a second conversation with a follow-up email
- Write a formal letter of reprimand if breach of conduct continues past second conversation and email

Superintendent Entry Plan: The First 100 Days

Introduction:

The Lyle Board of Directors has charged me, as incoming superintendent, with improving the educational outcomes for ALL students and ensuring that Lyle School District becomes a model district, with model schools, meeting the needs of each of our students, our communities' most valuable and precious resource.

The Board's Vision statement: "First and foremost, student success is our top priority!" sets a clear tone for what we should be about in the Lyle School District. The challenge is that, in all conversations and in review of our current documentation and evidence, it is clear that, though our staff have been working extremely hard, the systems and structures to ensure student success have not been in place. Every student within the Lyle School District deserves the finest teaching and school experience possible. It is our moral obligation to provide that and my moral obligation to lead that work.

Over the next 100 days, my goal as superintendent will be to adequately assess and immediately work to rectify any and all circumstances where "student success" is not governing our work. This lens along with my work history as a turnaround building leader will allow us, as a district, to build a plan that will ensure that each of our sons'/daughters' needs are not only met but that we support ALL children, as if they were our own, ensuring an equality in outcome for each of the students who rely on our school system for their future success!

Goals

1. To establish a respectful, positive district culture centered on teaching and learning. (Grade level literacy and performance in all subject areas; Positive Ambassadors for Lyle School District)
2. To focus all improvement efforts on continuous growth, mindful of grade level standards and proficiency. (Data protocols for monitoring student success)
3. To grow the fiscal health of our district ensuring an adequate ending fund balance and developing systems and structures to regularly update the infrastructure of our district on behalf of our students.
4. To align all district systems and structures for fiscal efficiency and educational outcomes for children at the core. (CCSS Implementation with Fidelity)
5. To shift the "ethos" of Lyle School District to eliminate out of district transfers, encourage transfers into our district, and ensure that a mindset of service and positive outcomes for all students permeates all our work, regardless of position. (Positive Ambassadors for Lyle School District)

Slow down

Speed limits in school zones are reduced for a reason. A pedestrian struck by a vehicle traveling at 25 mph is nearly two-thirds less likely to be killed compared to a pedestrian struck by a vehicle traveling just 10 mph faster.

Children on bikes are often inexperienced, unsteady and unpredictable. Slow down and allow at least three feet of passing distance between your vehicle and a bicyclist. Make sure your own children always wear a helmet whenever bicycling.
