Gorge Commission Looking At Marijuana Laws

During the Columbia River Gorge Commission's (CRGC) meeting Tuesday, Dec. 8, commissioners requested staff to prepare a memo providing guidance for the six counties of the Columbia River Gorge National Scenic Area in planning for the implementation of Oregon's Measure 91, and Washington Initiative 502.

The issue presented to CRGC is how the Oregon measure will be implemented in the Columbia River Gorge National Scenic Area, since using marijuana is still considered an offense under Federal law.

CRGC staff recommended to the Commission in April 2016 that Washington's I-502 regarding marijuana reform not be applicable in the National Scenic Area (NSA), specifically relating to the regulation of production, processing, and sales of marijuana. At that time, the Commission did not take action.

Now the Commission faces the same problem with Oregon's Measure 91. Wasco County planning director Angie Brewer, and Hood River County planning director John Roberts, approached the CRGC for guidance concerning handling applications for production, processing, and retail of marijuana in the NSA.

"The reason we're asking for direction is we have a lot of folks who are interested in growing, or retailing, or processing in some shape or form particularly in areas immediately around urban areas," explained Brewer, "and we're going to have to be able to give them some direction."

Oregon counties, such as Multnomah, have already begun drafting ordinances for implementing measure 91, which legalized recreational use of marijuana based on regulation and taxation determined by

the Oregon Liquor Control Commission.

During the meeting the Commission was presented with legal reasons provided by CRGC counsel Jeffrey Litwak, informing the Commission of it's inability to interpret the National Scenic Area Act and Management Plan to allow marijuana land uses within the NSA.

"Right now we're in the process of amending our ordinances outside of the scenic area to regulate the time and place or manner of marijuana related businesses," said Brewer. "We'd like to be able to provide that same level of protection outside of the larger areas."

"I think one thing that is really key is that the state has come forward saying that this is agriculture, the production of it [marijuana] is agriculture," said Brewer, "and without any objection from the commission about how that's implemented in the scenic area, we'd like to be consistent county wide in how we direct our residents."

At this time, neither Washington's I-502 or Oregon's M-91 have text applying its applicability of implementation in the Columbia River Gorge National Scenic Area. The NSA authorities do not regulate personal use of any substance or product; the issue lies solely with the land use and the production and processing of marijuana on NSA land.

"Another issue that I think we didn't anticipate until we started getting into the nitty-gritty details is you're likely to see these things come through: application for home occupations and cottage industries," explained Brewer. "So it won't be limited to commercial designations."

Courts in Oregon and Washington recognize the Commission receives its authority from federal law, since

Congress authorized the CRGC. This means the Commission's rules are treated as mandated or required by federal law, which courts recognize as preempting conflicting state laws.

"We would like some direction, without it we're left with a non-answer, and that's not really fair to our residents," said Brewer. "It's not really a good answer we'd like to be giving folks. Right now you've got six counties all coming at it from different angles to deal with similar issues."

The Washington State Liquor and Cannabis board's regulations for marijuana state the board won't approve marijuana licenses for a location on federal land. But the regulation fails to define federal land. Oregon's measure has similar text prohibiting approval of licenses and location of licensed premises on federal property, but fails to define federal property.

"So I think this is complex enough that it really does warrant an in depth look at what the impacts might be across the gorge," said Brewer. "Also it will help us provide a level of service we'd like to provide, not only to you [the Columbia River Gorge Commission] in implementing the management plan effectively, but to our residents in the counties across the scenic area."

The Oregon Liquor Control Commission will begin accepting applications for marijuana business licenses on Jan. 4, 2016, and will begin requesting land use compatibility statements from the counties soon after. The memo that was requested will be prepared this week, and will be made available to the public and counties at that time.

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Book Report

The Crossing

Harry Bosch is at loose ends now that he is no longer employed by the Los Angeles Police Department. Fortunately, criminal defense attorney Mickey Haller has a task that may be right up Bosch's alley--to find out whether Haller's client, Da'Quan Foster, is being framed for the beating death of thirty-eight year old Alexandra Parks, an assistant city manager for West Hollywood. The trial is scheduled to take place in six weeks. Harry is reluctant to cross over to defense work, also known as "the dark side." Still, if a miscarriage of justice has occurred, Bosch has the skills and determination to uncover the truth.

Since Harry no longer has a badge, he has no official standing. All he has is "a letter of engagement" stating that he is operating under the aegis of Mickey Haller and his licensed private investigator, Dennis Wojciechowski, who has been injured in an accident. Haller gives Harry the murder book, which Bosch proceeds to scrutinize. In addition, Harry contacts his former partner, who takes risks to help him procure further information. Michael Connelly's "The Crossing" has multiple meanings. First, Harry crosses over from the prosecution to the defense, a move that makes neither him nor her former colleagues happy. A crossing may also be "the place where the circle of the victim's life overlaps the circle of the predator." Why and under what circumstances did these people meet and how did they interact? Harry will not stop digging until he knows the answers to all of these questions. He methodically examines the facts, employs his finely honed instincts to good effect, and interviews witnesses to clarify matters. Gradually he puts the pieces together and discovers a conspiracy involving greed, brutality, extortion, and corruption.

Although some may prefer Bosch with badge in hand, it is fascinating to observe him facing this new chapter in his life. With his daughter leaving for college, he is an empty nester. His existence is solitary, with little to occupy his time other than restoring a 1950 Harley-Davidson motorcycle and listening to his beloved jazz music.

Harry is most fulfilled when he gets his teeth into a complex inquiry; he notices small but telling details that others overlook and derives satisfaction from identifying and apprehending killers. Michael Connelly, who is one of the best in the business, presents us with a well-constructed and compelling plot; intriguing characters; spare, vivid, and fast-moving prose; sardonic humor; pitch perfect dialogue; an atmospheric California setting; and an iconic hero who is stubborn, brilliant, irascible, and always true to himself and his unique code of ethics.

Stolen Pets

There has recently been a number of missing dogs from the Dallesport area. It is suspected that these dogs did not run away on their own, but were stolen.

It's a scary thought, as we'd never want anyone to get their hands on our furry friends and do them harm. But why are people stealing dogs anyway? There are a number of reasons – all of them for money. Some dogs are stolen to be used in illegal fighting rings and training methods, but most others are re-sold as pets for a lot of cash or even bred so that puppies can be sold for even more money.

According to the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (ASPCA) approximately 2 million dogs, cats and other companion animals are stolen each year. Equally disheartening is that the theft of family pets is on the rise. While many pets are stolen when in their yards, or during a burglary or home invasion, the predominant ways that companion animals are stolen are when they are left in cars or tied outside waiting for their owner(s) to return from shopping or eating in a restaurant. As well meaning as these pet owners may be it seems obvious that many thefts occur due to human behavior.

To prevent our furry loved ones from being stolen the ASPCA suggests that we do the following:

Never leave your pet tied outside a store or alone in a car, even if you will be inside for just a minute. A well-meaning individual may actually believe your pet has been abandoned, and take her away in an attempt to ensure her safety.

Never leave your pet outdoors unattended. Your pet should be safely indoors at all times, and should always be within your sight or earshot when outdoors.

When outdoors, your dog should be in a securely fenced yard. Pets who normally stay near home can become frightened, or enticed to leave by an interesting sight or smell, and may not be able to find their way home – they may not be technically stolen, but are gone nevertheless.

Always check to ensure that fence gates are securely closed before



allowing your dog outdoors, and regularly check for holes in or under the fencing that a dog could slip through.

Make sure your pet is wearing a collar and ID tag with your current contact information included. It is a good idea to microchip your pet, and put the tag that identifies the microchip company and ID number on her collar.

Build a pet-friendly network of neighbors who can monitor suspicious activity in your neighborhood and intervene if they see your pet walking with a stranger.

Report a missing pet immediately to police and animal control authorities, and mobilize your neighborhood with searching.

Print flyers and prominently display MISSING DOG across the top with a huge picture. Point out any definitive marks on your dog. Only include personal information that you want shared. It isn't recommended that you put the address down. Contact local pet stores, shelters, and vets to post your flyers.

Use social media to get the information out. On Facebook join "Dallesport Neighbors" and post photos.

Northshore Moving, Offers Property To Skyline Hospital

Skyline Hospital's Board of Commissioners met Tuesday, Dec. 15, at Skyline Hospital to consider an action item regarding the acquisition of the NorthShore Medical Group's (NSMG) property and buildings that neighbor the hospital.

Skyline commissioners have yet to publicly state their intent toward NSMG's offer to sell its property to the hospital district. NSMG is going to build a new clinic at a new location in lower White Salmon, off State Route 14, according to City of White Salmon Planning Commission records. NSMG's selling price was not disclosed during the meeting.

The board met mostly in executive session when it came time to discuss the NSMG offer. NSMG physicians and its administrator attended the meeting. The medical group attends the public meetings regularly but sat in during last week's meeting specifically to discuss NSMG's property and buildings, since there's been some back and forth between NorthShore and Skyline regarding the acquisition of the clinic's assets. At one point during the executive session, Sky-line commissioners invited North-Shore representatives to join them behind closed doors.

When the time came for the item (listed under Old Business as "NSMG Property and Building") to be addressed, Skyline board chairman Jonathan Blake made a motion to move the item into an executive session. Other board members agreed and the item was moved.

Once the topic of NSMG Property and Buildings was moved to an executive session, the discussion became closed to the public.

Skyline's board has the authority to move an item into executive session if the "consideration of the selection of a site or the acquisition of real estate by lease or purchase when public knowledge regarding such consideration would cause an increased price," as stated in chapter 42.30 Open Public Meetings Act of the Revised Code of Washington (RCW) 2015 supplement.

When the executive session was called to order, those attending from NSMG and members of the public were escorted out of the room to be summoned later during the session. While still in an executive session, Skyline board members called NorthShore physicians/partners Alicia Gimenez, Allen LaBerge, and Gregory Zuck into the meeting to discuss the purchase of NSMG's assets.

Later, Blake explained the reasoning behind the move. "Each commissioner has their own opinion on what to offer and how to structure the payment and lease. [As chairman] I felt it was in the district's best interests for the commissioners to be able to openly discuss, agree or disagree amongst ourselves and felt going back and forth publicly would have been counterproductive to the process."

Blake also said that he feared public knowledge regarding purchase of the NSMG property could "adversely impact the price of the property for the district."

Skyline Hospital's commissioners have yet to publicly declare its intent to purchase NSMG's assets. When asked if the board has agreed to purchase of NSMG's facilities, Blake replied, "I can't say that we have agreed to the purchase the building yet, because we have not yet come to an agreement with NorthShore on what we think is fair market value."

Excluded from the executive session were NSMG administrator Cindy Roberts and NSMG physicians Liette Witherrite, Troy Witherrite, and Christopher Samuels.

NorthShore Medical Group has presented the board with appraisals estimating the cost of purchasing the clinic located on Skyline Hospital land. Currently NSMG is in the permitting process of its new potential location, which would be located off of State Route 14 east of Bridge Park RV. The medical group is proposing a single-story, 15,500 square-foot professional office building at the State Route 14 site, which would be constructed in two phases.

NSMG's physicians and administrator expressed concern to Skyline commissioners about their handling of the topic. While the Skyline board continued to meet in an executive session NSMG stated its desire for the discussion to take place in the public domain.

After the executive session, the board made a motion to hold a special meeting on Jan. 6, 2016, at 7 a.m., at Skyline Hospital. The topic to be addressed will be the purchasing of NorthShore Medical Group's assets. Blake said the discussion may be moved into an executive session again depending on the board's decision. Any final action taken, however, would have to be moved and voted on in a public meeting.
