Historic Preservation Month Open House

May 1, 2016

The Civic Auditorium will be hosting the 3rd Annual Open House celebrating Historic Preservation Month during May. The event will be held on Sunday, May 1st from 11am to 3pm. The event is open to the public. This year's theme is "This Place Matters."

City of The Dalles Landmarks Commission and The Dalles Main Street are partnering with the Civic for the event. Members of the commission will be on hand to speak to attendees about what the commission does and the importance of historic preservation. The Dalles Main Street will also be on hand to talk about their organization and the historic preservation of the downtown area.

According to Trish Neal, Program Manager at the Civic and organizer of the annual event, local organizations and individuals who have recently conducted or are currently conducting historic preservation on their buildings were invited to share photographic displays of their projects. Among those invited are: Fort Dalles Museum, Wing Hong Hai Co. (owned by Eric Gleason), IOOF Building, Herbring House (owned by Victor Johnson), and St. Peter's Landmark.

This year's open house is focusing specifically on historic preservation and its importance to the community.

"We wanted visitors to the open house to see what can be done to preserve local history," Neal explained. "Inviting organizations and individuals who have recently conducted work or are currently working on their buildings was seen as a good way to show what can be done even if it is a small project."

Neal went on to explain that this year's theme, "This Place Matters," embodies the sentiment of the local community involved in historic preservation. To show the community the number of historic buildings orange "flags" or icons will be posted in the windows of historic buildings downtown and possibly in the windows of some of the local historical homes.

"We hope that as people drive around town and see the orange icons in the windows that they will recognize that we have a lot of great historic buildings and that these places matter to The Dalles," said Neal.

The open house will include tours of the Civic Auditorium, photographic displays of local projects, and information on historic preservation. In addition, the Civic Auditorium Historic Preservation Committee (CAHPC) will be kicking off their Theatre Renovation Capital Campaign during the open house.

Community Council Corner

Jim Smith, Klickitat PUD Manager, presented an update on the wastewater and electric systems which serve Dallesport and Murdock. Mr. Smith gave a handout which showed the rate and customer information for the wastewater system. The year 2015 ended with about \$115,597 of net cash flow, an increase of about \$112,000 over 2014. More details of this financial report is available from the PUD. There was discussion about the grinder pumps for the sewage system.

A question was asked why there was no camper dump station or a septic tank disposal at the sewage plant. Mr. Smith said he would look into providing those services.

We can expect a rate increase of about 3% in June 2016. There was discussion about how the PUD produces power from hydro, wind, and methane and the efficiency of each source. There was discussion about why they use those resources for electricity production. The PUD has a long term contract with BPA which is in effect until 2028. At that time the ratio of power production will be reevaluated. There 103 solar customers in the county.

Gordon Kelsey, Director of Public Works, spoke about work items going on in the county. Work is proposed for Dallesport road and sidewalks along 6th Street. Mr. Kelsey said they would construct phase one of the gun range this summer which will allow people to shoot at that location. There will be a meeting in May in Dallesport for public information and input.

Klickitat County Commissioners, Prosecutor Quesnel and I, Sheriff Songer, have been meeting over several months now with the BIA, Yakama Nation representatives, Yakama Tribal Police, an Assistant US Attorney, Yakima County Sheriff Winters, Yakima County Prosecutor's Office, Police Chiefs from Union Gap, Wapato and Toppenish, along with the FBI and other officials in regards to Retrocession.

In short Retrocession would allow the Yakama Nation to govern themselves.

Initially this would have little impact on Klickitat County Sheriff's Office law enforcement activities. Retrocession would only apply within the current boundaries of the Yakama Reservation.

It should be noted however, the Yakama Nation, for years, has taken the position that Track D of the Treaty takes in Glenwood Valley and East to Grayback area,

The United States Department of the Interior agrees with the Yakama Nation and has decided that Track D of the Treaty takes in the Town of Glenwood and a large portion of Glenwood Valley. Starting on April 19, 2016 the Yakama Nation considers Glenwood Valley part of the Yakama Indian Reservation.

Klickitat County has taken legal action to appeal the United States Department of the Interior decision. It may, however, take some time before the Court will make a ruling on this matter.

Even under Retrocession, Tribal Police will have no jurisdiction over Non Native Americans.

The County Commissioners, Prosecutor Quesnel and I have taken the position that Track D of the Treaty is the current Yakama Reservation Boundary and does not include the town of Glenwood or any portion of the Glenwood Valley.

Therefore we do not consider the town of Glenwood or any portion of Glenwood Valley part of the Reservation.

The Klickitat County Sheriff's Office will be conducting law enforcement activities, responding to calls, taking reports, issuing citations and making arrest as we have always done. All enforcement activity involving citations or arrest will be handled by our Prosecutors Office, NOT TRIBAL COURT. All arrest made will be booked into the Klickitat County Jail. All Citations issued will be cited into Klickitat County East or West District Court.

I plan on having additional deputies in the Glenwood area on April 19, 2016 to show Law Enforcement support for the citizens of Glenwood Valley. I don't believe there will be any problems but I just want to show strong support for the citizens.

Many Gather To Remember Late Deputy Michael J. McNabb On 30th anniversary of his death

Sheriff Mike McNabb, 26, was patrolling State Route 14 on a west-bound course at around 2:30 a.m. in his department-issue Ford LTD sedan.

When the dispatch center lost radio contact with Deputy Mc-Nabb in the third hour of that Thursday morning, the dispatcher became concerned and alerted superiors. After a short wait and still only radio silence, the department launched a search for the deputy.

The search confirmed the worst suspicion: McNabb had died in the line of duty at around 2:30 west of Murdock, in a fiery, nearly head-on collision with a vehicle being driven by a drunk, who somehow survived the horrific event.

On Sunday, April 17 — the 30th anniversary of Deputy McNabb's death — his family, friends, mentors, and many acquaintances gathered in the Lyle Secondary School gym to remember someone who was a beloved and trusted figure in his home town of Lyle, and see for the first time highway memorial signs in his honor.

The signs went up Monday: one before the western entrance to Lyle tunnels and one near milepost 81, west of Murdock. They designate that section of SR 14 the Deputy Michael J. McNabb Memorial Highway. On the back of each sign are messages written by people who attended Sunday's memorial.

The signs represent the culmination of an effort undertaken by former



Dallesport resident Henry Griffith to bring long overdue recognition to the late deputy he had come to know as a youngster.

Griffith recalls April 17, 1986. He was 15 at the time and remembers that school was cancelled that day because the highway was closed for investigation.

In his letter proposing the renaming of a section of SR 14 in McNabb's honor, Griffith wrote to the Washington State Transportation Commission, "I have since traveled around the country, as my job requires me to travel a lot, and everywhere I go I see highways, bridges, streets, and so forth named for fallen law enforcement officers. I think this would be a fitting honor for Deputy McNabb."

Griffith worked his way through the Transportation Commission's process for renaming state transportation facilities, with the assistance of commission staff. He rounded up political and community support for the initiative.

The request for renaming finally made it to the Transportation Commission on Dec. 8, 2015, at which time adopted a resolution approving the designation and requesting that the Washington State Department of Transportation provide signs to reflect the designation.

Griffith was among those who spoke at the ceremony on Sunday that Karl Nyholm helped organize. Nyholm is a

former White Salmon police officer who became friends with McNabb, who was promoted to deputy sheriff in August 1982.

Nyholm reminisced about his friendship with McNabb, as did boyhood friend and college classmate Bill Marshall, former White Salmon officer Larry Spencer, and Bob Kindler, who was McNabb's mentor at the Sheriff's Office.

After hearing these stories, longtime Lyle resident Don Brashers proposed that they be recorded as history. He encouraged those who shared their stories to contact him.
