## City Examines Deal With Animal Shelter Contractor Mabrey, Facing Criminal Charges, Apologizes To Council

**DOGGED EFFORTS:** Concern has arisen about whether or not the city's contract with Dogs of the Gorge will be renewed.

### Another chance for DOGs

Statements of support, praise, and cooperation were the overwhelming response to the latest wrinkle in the unfolding Dogs of the Gorge (DOG) saga, which played out at Monday night's city council meeting. The first sign of trouble came the previous Monday, in a posting on the DOG Facebook page. The message said that the city had opted not to renew its contract with the organization, which provides shelter and sets up adoptions for stray dogs on an entirely volunteer basis. This would mean that after Dec. 31, it would have to vacate the city animal shelter on Wing Road, its current base of operation. DOG would be homeless.

In a press release issued this Monday afternoon, Goldendale Police Chief Reggie Bartkowski said two issues cast doubt on the contract's renewal. One is that the shelter is in serious disrepair and needs to be either remodeled or demolished and replaced with a new shelter. The other is that Lisa Mabrey, DOG founder, is the subject of a criminal case involving charges of theft and trespassing.

According to the case file, Mabrey entered a neighbor's yard without permission and took a live-animal trap from their porch. When questioned by police, she at first denied her involvement. She later admitted to taking the trap because she said it had captured her son's cat. She added that subsequently she returned the empty trap to the porch.

At the council meeting, Mabrey apologized for her conduct. In turn,

Chief Bartkowski, Mayor Michael Canon, and other members of the council commended her for her service to the stray dogs of Klickitat

County. Bartkowski stressed the need to rebuild the city's relationship with DOG, and recommended a one-year extension of the contract.

When the council opened the floor to public comment, it received an outpouring of support for DOG, as well as concerns and suggestions regarding the state of the shelter and county-wide Animal Control.

The immediate resolution was a temporary reprieve. Because the current contract ends Dec. 31 and the next council meeting will not take place until 7 p.m. Jan. 3, DOG would effectively lose its right to the shelter for the first three days of the month. The council passed a motion extending the contract to cover this period. At the next meeting, the council expects to approve a new one-year contract with DOG.

### A Need for County-Wide Control

In his closing remarks, Canon summed up the feeling in the room. "This day started out pretty dark [ . . . ] but the community kind of gathered around in support of the dogs, and that kind of turned our focus to the dogs."

One object of that focus is the need for better Animal Control throughout the county. At present, the Sheriff's office



relies heavily on DOG-in fact, most of the dogs serviced by DOG are from outside Goldendale. Danielle Olsen, a DOG volunteer and sheriff's posse member who fields Animal Control calls, said she gets about 10 calls per week. "WDFW called us [DOG] last summer [ . . . ], state patrol has gotten ahold of us [ . . . ] I definitely see a need in the county."

At its next meeting, the council will discuss setting up a special committee to explore county-wide Animal Control solutions.

### Shelter conditions

According to DOG volunteer Elena James, saying the shelter needs work is "the understatement of the century." James cited a number of safety concerns, including decrepit water and electrical systems, nonexistent outdoor lighting, and kennels that are falling apart.

Canon asked James, Mabrey, and other DOG volunteers to draw up a list of priority repairs, which will help generate an estimate of the funding needed to restore the shelter.

### "Belgravia" by Julian Fellowes

## Dallesport's Dirt Hugger Earns Praise

If composting could be considered cooking with microbes, then Dallesport's Dirt Hugger is working with a winning recipe.

After almost a decade of curing microbe dirt, the regional composting company was recently recognized by the Washington Organics Recycling Council (WORC) and presented with the 2016 Com-posting Innovation award. Dirt Hugger was presented with the award during the WORC's annual conference.

"We were actually just at the conference, and had no idea and then they sort of announced it. We were really honored and humbled to get it, we weren't expecting it at all," explained co-founder Pierce Louis. "It's really a major team effort, our whole team here helped build this site."

Louis and his coworker and friend Tyler Miller launched Dirt Hugger in 2010 after leaving the world of aerospace and drones, instead focusing on the ground to engineer compost. Before moving to their Dallesport site, the composters operated on a leased lot in Hood River's Industrial Park.

The composting site, located two-miles north from The Dalles bridge, is designed to have flow, Louis said. Trucks enter with waste, drive to a dumping pad, release material then drive around the lot for the exit. Compost piles work on a 90-day rotation and start downwind, slowly moving in succession to their end point at the west end of the lot.

"We have recipes based on what comes in," said Louis, "So we get in fruit waste from the packing houses, we get in brush waste from places like Hood River garbage, and then we get in commercial food waste." Beer waste and cherry sludge also make it into the composting piles filling seven acres of their nine-acre lot leased from Klickitat County.

"We have recipes based on that, you know it's this much fruit waste, this much brush, this much beer, and that's what makes a recipe," Louis explained. If you get it right, it becomes a thermophile process where microbes proliferate and heat the piles of organic material to break down the pile's contents, he added.

"There's a bunch of different organic waste a lot of which were going to the landfill before, so it's awesome to keep it out," noted Louis. "Our whole goal is to have the same products at the end,

but you have very different inputs depending on the time of the year. So, you have to be really cognizant of your recipes and what's going on."

Dirt Hugger's innovation came from heaps of industry research before Louis and Miller launched their own composting campaign. One of the pluses of the industry they work in is how willing the competition is to offer advice, Louis noted.

"The really cool thing about this industry is you don't really compete with anybody that's more than 100 miles away, so people are very willing to share ideas, and so the industry is very familial. There's a lot of idea sharing," explained Louis.

"Part of the innovation is a lot of people's input, a lot of people's help, so it was really kind of a team effort," he



added.

Dirt Hugger takes regional organic waste and processes the material into compost after a 90-day process. "This site is sort of designed to do about 40,000 tons a year of material, and this year we'll do a little over 30,000. Last year we did 20-something-thousand, so it's grown a bunch," said Louis.

## **Port Bridge Study Would Build On Previous Work**

Back in the early 1990s, a little-known entity called the Klickitat County Regional Transportation Policy Organization identified replacement of the aging Hood River Bridge as a transportation imperative, in a regional transportation plan (RTP) for the county prepared in conjunction with and by the Southwest Washington Regional Transportation Council (SWRTC) based in Vancouver. The RTP was last updated in 2014.

The Washington Legislature gave the project a boost when designated a State Route 35 corridor in the 1997 legislative session. The SR-35 corridor would provide a future link across the Columbia River to Oregon from the Bingen/White Salmon area.

A Draft Environmental Impact Statement for a future river crossing in the SR-35 corridor was completed in 2004, and a Type, Size, and Location Study was completed in 2011. A Final

Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) would be the next step in the project development process.

Dale Robins, a senior planner at SWRTC who is intimately familiar with the Klickitat County RTP, said the Port of Hood River project would build off the work that has already been completed.

“The Port’s proposal would take the project to 70 percent design and complete the Final EIS,” Robins said Monday. “If selected for funding, this grant request would bring us much closer to a new bridge.”

Robins noted, “I have not seen the grant proposal, but I believe the request will include right-of-way on the Washington side. I would hope many questions could also be answered, such as ownership, financing, etc.”

According to the 2014 RTP update, “The RTP supports the replacement of the Hood River Bridge. The Hood River Bridge is a major

transportation corridor providing access between southwest Klickitat County and Hood River, Oregon. The Hood River Bridge provides the principle access for southwest Klickitat County to employment, services, and goods. This facility is important for the movement of local goods (fruit and timber) to market. This facility is essential to the region’s diversification by providing access and employment opportunities related to the tourism/recreational sector. The existing facility is narrow and inadequate to handle the demands of the region. The facility is aging and will likely need to be replaced within the next 15-20 years. The local economy depends heavily on the Hood River Bridge, ensuring an adequate replacement facility is a high priority for the region.”
